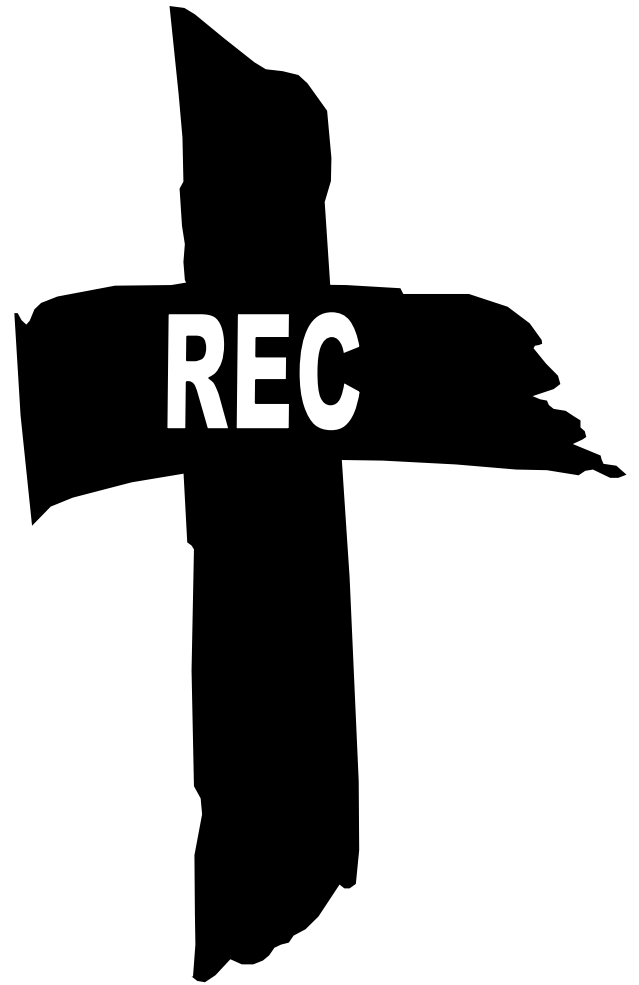

PART 1

LAY DIRECTOR GUIDELINES

Lay Director Guidelines

Lay Directors are chosen by the DaySpring R.E.C. Board of Directors by prayer and knowledge of your love and commitment to Jesus and this ministry. The following are some expectations of Lay Directors.

- ◆ Have at least one R.E.C board member on your team (can be in any position, ie: asst. or table leader, agape, etc). A board member not on you team will address your first formation with some do's and don'ts.
- ◆ Choose one assistant who has been a past Lay Director or assistant and one that would be a candidate for future Lay Director--someone that has a heart for this ministry, and has worked several R.E.C. weekends in the past and has worked several positions.
- ◆ One of your assistants will be responsible for maintaining an accurate credit & debit accounting along with a financial report to be given to the Board of Directors upon your exit review with the Board at the first regular monthly meeting following your R.E.C. weekend. Attachment "A" is a guideline of how the credit/debit report should be formatted.
- ◆ Attempt to have 50% of your team made up of people that have never worked a R.E.C before, the other half veterans that will mentor new team members.
- ◆ Suggestions for Spiritual Team are welcome, but the final approval for the Spiritual Team, including the Spiritual Director must be approved by the Board Spiritual Director. Please discuss this position before contacting any clergy / lay persons.
- ◆ Dates of your R.E.C. weekend must be confirmed with officials at each facility. Use your Board of Directors to assist.
- ◆ Housing arrangements will be the responsibility of the Board. The location for team formation meetings will be the responsibility of the Lay Director. Also, the number of meetings & the length of them are the responsibility of the Lay Director.
- ◆ The Saturday evening meal along with promotion of the candlelight service is the responsibility of the Lay Director. Should you require a check to cover these expenses in advance please contact the R.E.C. treasurer. Tony Glotzbach will provide the Saturday meal for jails that allow food to be brought in for both the team & the residents. It's up to the Lay Director to contact Nancy Kennedy at 812-944-9341 to arrange this.
- ◆ Follow-up meetings after your R.E.C. weekend are also the responsibility of the Lay Director, providing follow-ups are allowed.
- ◆ Required to attend one Board meeting for orientation prior to the R.E.C. weekend.
- ◆ Movement of the R.E.C. trailer for the weekend is the responsibility of the Lay Director.
- ◆ Provide the Board with a copy of your final team roster and a team picture after the R.E.C. weekend.
- ◆ Agape letters are available from the Emmaus Community (worldwide). If you wish to receive agape letters of encouragement you may register the weekend dates on the following web site; www.bmi.net/his/palanca.htm

Please work with your board sponsor for any help or questions that may arise.

Composition of a REC Team

A typical REC weekend will have a team consisting of:

1 Lay Director

2 Assistant Lay Directors

3 Spiritual Team Members (Suggested that they be clergy, but is not required) -- Must be approved by Board. On a women's walk, try to limit number of men on team.

8 Table Leaders

8 Assistant Table Leaders

4 - 5 Agape Team Members

4 - 5 Music Team Members (On women's walks, try to limit number of men on music team).

1 Sound Board person

1 Power Point person (may be combined with sound person)

Note: A member of the REC board must be on the team.

LAY DIRECTOR CHECKLIST

REC LAY DIRECTOR'S CHECKLIST

- Checklist - Startup
 - Review the checklist in detail with the Board Sponsor
 - Schedule Your Weekend and meet with the Facility Point of Contact (Lay Director & Board Sponsor)
 - Discuss and arrange Meals and mealtimes at the Facility
 - Collect information such as meal times, pill call, family visit time, etc. so the moment-by-moment schedule can be updated to reflect the accurate times.
 - Plan to attend next REC Board meeting to be prayed over and ask questions.
 - Receive Advance funding + Discuss Deposits & Cash Advances
 - See Manual Part 6.
 - Purchases made by Agape Team Leader or ALD - Finance. Tax Exempt - Non Profit status exists.
 - Determine status of Lodging - Arrangements will normally be coordinated by the Board Sponsor and will be provided by them.
- Reserve Church for Formation Meetings, Team Dinner (if applicable)
- Reserve Church for Community Candlelight (See Previous Section)
 - Churches - Things to Remember
 - Music & Custodial Fees
- Select a Theme, create Community Prayer Chart and see that it is brought for signup at all upcoming Emmaus events such as Gatherings, etc. Martha Metts is willing to make your prayer chart for you, if you contact her with details.
- Select a Theme Song
- Select a Theme Scripture
- Make community prayer chart. Martha Metts is willing to make prayer charts for any REC you will need to ask her to do this!
- Choose your team-Requirements to be on the Team
 - Attended Cursillo type weekend including Emmaus Walk, REC, KAIROS, etc.
 - Spiritual Director shall be Board Approval
 - Discuss Responsibilities
 - Arrange devotion & communion at all meetings
 - Anointing Service
 - Spiritual Team
 - Discuss Responsibilities

 - Assistant Lay Director (Program)
 - "Right-Hand-Man" during Formation

- Reads script on REC weekend
- Spends time in front of the group
- Introduces speakers

 - Collects/manages money (Provide a copy of LD Manual, Part 5: Financial Reports)
 - Keeps schedule moving on weekend
 - Notifies speakers + prayer partners for talks
 - Speaker pray-in and prayer.

 - In charge of trailer supplies, set-up and tear down.
 - Uses Agape Team Leader book as guide for Agape team activities during formation meetings, lodging activities, candlelight and facility activities.

 - Serve the residents and team.

 - Music is a vital part of the formation meetings and the REC weekend

- o Special requirements exist for Team Members who are past residents. Check with requirements at each facility.

SAMPLE TEAM LETTER

February 7, 2002

Dear One,

We have been given an important assignment and responsibility. Continue to pray for the team, especially the Clergy and speakers. Pray for our families, the Residents, and also the staff at Harrison County. May God continue to equip us for this job He has blessed us with.

PREPARATION OF A TALK

Unless you are an accomplished speaker, you probably swallowed hard at the thought of speaking before a group and, after much prayer and meditation, reluctantly agreed. Even accomplished speakers are not facile speakers when it comes to matters of faith.

It is hoped that these guidelines will ease some of your anxiety and help you in preparing and presenting your talk.

STEP ONE: HAVE CONFIDENCE IN YOURSELF!!

You were asked to give a talk because somebody thought you had something important to share and thought you would be able to say it in a sincere and positive way.

No one . . . **NO ONE** . . . expects you to “have-em rollin’ in the aisles” with humor, and no one expects you to sway thousands with your great oratorical skills.

Don’t put yourself down just because you’ve never spoken in front of a group, or because you don’t consider yourself a “speaker.” Remember, it is often the ones with the biggest mouths who have the least to say.

And there is help available. You will be provided with an outline for your talk. You will share your talk by giving it for the other team members who will be helping you. Any of those persons who have given talks in the past will be honored to help you prepare yours. Just ask.

STEP TWO: KNOW YOUR AUDIENCE!!

Most R.E.C. participants are already Christians. There will be many denominations represented. Some of the participants will be further along in their pilgrimages than will others. Since you will be speaking to individuals from wide-ranging backgrounds, avoid controversial subjects that tend to arouse divisions such as denominational differences, speaking in tongues, etc.

STEP THREE: KNOW YOUR SUBJECT . . . READ YOUR OUTLINE!!

Study the outline and critique information you have been given. Reread it carefully. If you want to, discuss it with the Lay or Spiritual Directors for the REC. A good source of help would be the notes you took on your weekend. These notes and the other information stir other ideas for the talk. Talk to people who have given the talk before. They will be glad to help. But, remember, this is your talk and needs to tell your story.

Once you feel you understand what your outline is trying to say, make sure you read through it again. When you’ve got a good grasp on the main points, take a close look at the outline introduction. Read that introduction at least seventy times seven! Emboss it on your mind. The introduction tells you the reason you are standing up in front of

everyone giving a talk. It often tells you what NOT to say. Make a vow to yourself to follow as closely as possible the instructions in the introduction. Remember, your talk will build on the other talks (unless you are lucky enough to be the first talk given) and will serve as a building block for all the talks after yours (unless you are lucky enough to be the last talk). So don't stray from the introduction or you may do damage to other talks.

STEP FOUR: BUILD YOUR TALK AROUND THE OUTLINES

Recognize that talks can be divided into three basic parts:

1. The Opening
2. The Main Body of the Talk
3. The Closing

Each has a specific purpose.

1. **The Opening** should be designed to capture the interest of your listener, set the "tone" of the talk, and help put you at ease. It may be humorous, statistical, reverent, or a combination of these. Most important, the Opening should be directly related to your subject. Don't open with a bit of interesting statistical information about the number of hairs on the head of an average human being unless you intend to talk about, maybe, the Scriptural promise that "even the hairs of your head are numbered." Don't open with a joke if the "tone" of your talk must be serious from the very beginning.

Start off making the talk your own by picking an Opening that you find interesting and that you believe will tie-in directly with the subject of your talk. If you are interested, your audience will be interested and you and your listeners will quickly get comfortable with one another. And making you comfortable with your audience is one of the purposes of the opening, remember?

2. **The Main Body** of the talk contains the meat of what you have to say. It is the main course. The points you cover here are the reason for the talk.

Get in the habit of making a statement about one of your main points and then illustrating it. For example:

"Although Christians are charged with the responsibility of counseling and nurturing one another, we must be careful about giving advice." (That's the main point.)

"Whenever I think of giving advice to someone, I am reminded of the little boy who was asked to give a report on Socrates. He stood up in class and said: "Socrates was a very wise man. He gave people lots of good advice. They poisoned him!" (That's the illustration.)

Illustrations are very important, and the ones from our own personal experiences are best because they relate so directly to others. But you can also use humorous stories, quotes from famous people, and parables to illustrate your main points.

Props are sometimes helpful, too. Don't hesitate to use a chalkboard or diagrams of charts if you think those will help put your point across. A stool with one leg missing would be an excellent way to illustrate the need for all three elements of Piety, Study an Action to be present to support The Life Grace (the stool). But be careful. Practice using your props before standing up in front of your group to give your talk. There are scads of horror stories about those who fail to heed this warning.

One final note in regard to the Main Body. It has been said before: Be careful not to stray from you outline or you are liable to get so far afield in your talk and do harm to the unity of the weekend.

3. **The Closing** of your talk should summarize your main points of pull them together in a creative way so that your listeners will remember those key things you want them to remember, even if they forget everything else. It is usually NOT humorous. It may be tied in with your opening remarks made at the beginning of the talk. Leave your listeners with a thirst for more information and a desire to take some action (even if that action is limited for the time being to simply talking and sharing at their tables). If you are able to do so, set the stage for the next speaker by suggesting that there will be more information on that subject later on.

End on a positive note. Leave your audience challenged with the feeling that they can and should know more about the subject of your talk. The talk should be no more than 30 minutes in length.

Two special words before we finish:

- A. Take a look at the bibliography that follows and get some resource scriptures and collect additional information to supplement it. There are many such materials. There are many available on the Internet or at your local library.
- B. Some of the talks are design to allow more emotional content than others. Look both to our outline and to the guidance of your Lay Director in regard to this. Generally, the talks early in the weekend are more informational in nature, speaking head to head, brain to brain, intellect to intellect. The talks later in the weekend can contain more heart to heart sharing from the speaker. You have been chosen for a particular talk because of a special and personal experience you have had with the Lord Jesus. If you are concerned about whether to include such experience in our talk, or if your are concerned about how to handle them, see your lay or spiritual directors for counsel and advice.

The Bible – in many versions all of which can be helpful. The Book of Proverbs and the parables of Jesus make good illustrations and openers. But be careful not to avoid the intended meaning of scriptures just to make a point.

A World Almanac: Good statistical resource.

The Guinness Book of World Records: Good statistical resource.

Bartlett's Familiar Quotations: excellent source of quotes from famous people on hundreds of subjects.

Nelson's Complete Concordance: will help you find those half-remembered Bible verses.

MIND YOUR P'S AND Q'S

DELIVERY:

- Length of Talk
- Voice Volume
- Varied Intonation

IDEALS

Ideals are those intangible concepts we measure everything against. This is a purely secular talk that examines what drives us internally. Most little boys had heroes they dreamed of being just like. Most little girls had dreams of Cinderella. What was it about these figures that stimulated them? What has happened in their values to cause them to let go of those dreams? How have their values changed? Were their heroes super villains that designed perfect crimes? Did they hope someday to spend a portion of their lives in jail? Probably not. Although this talk does not begin with the Prayer to the Holy Spirit and God is not mentioned in any way, the table discussions that follow ironically almost always include Him in some fashion. (Length 20 minutes)

PURPOSE OF THE TALK: To lead the listener to examine their own personal values and conclude for themselves that their lives are off track

POINTS TO COVER:

1. What "is " an ideal?
2. Our Ideals change as we grow.
3. Where are you right now?
 - * How do I spend my spare time?
 - * How do I spend my money?
 - * What do I think about?

SUGGESTED APPROACHES:

1. Concept of childhood heroes, ie Superman or Cinderella

GOD IS CALLING

Usually considered a spiritual team presentation, this is a critical talk that sets the stage for the rest of the REC weekend. In many ways it is the REC version of the Prevenient Grace Talk from the Walk to Emmaus. This talk introduces the Residents to the Prayer to the Holy Spirit and is designed to assure each of them that God knows and loves them. (Length 20 minutes)

PURPOSE OF THE TALK: to assure the listener there is hope for each of them through Christ.

POINTS TO COVER

1. God knows and loves them.
2. He has a specific plan to lead them, individually, back to a life more abundant.
3. Their lives will never be complete without Him.

SUGGESTED APPROACHES:

1. List things that have taken place before you ever knew God where you were kept safe. Examples might be accidents, unexpected relationships, knowing when to get out of harm's way.:

SUGGESTED SCRIPTURES:

Revelation 3:20 Behold, I stand at the door, and knock; if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me.

Psalms 139:13 For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb

Jeremiah 1:5 Before I formed thee in the belly I knew thee; and before thou earnest forth out of the womb I sanctified thee, and I ordained thee a prophet unto the nations.

THE PRODIGAL

Like the Ideals Talk, this one does not begin with the Prayer to the Holy Spirit. But, unlike the other talks on Friday evening there is no discussion following the talk. (Length 20 minutes)

This Talk MUST begin with the reading of The Prodigal son story found in Luke 15:11-24. Read the entire passage.

(Note: Most of the Residents won't have the first clue what the word "prodigal" even means. Without that they may not be able to understand the point of your talk. Define the term, explain that this applies to you, give your testimony and summarize how your story is like the Bible story - and their story can be that also.)

PURPOSE OF THE TALK: to cause the listener to understand that their personal sins are not too great for God to forgive.

POINTS TO COVER:

1. The speaker turned his/her back on God.
2. The speaker lived a life of sin
3. The speaker recognized the error of his/her ways and has been accepted back into the loving arms of Jesus.

At the end of the talk the Residents are told that there will be no table discussion of that talk. This talk concludes the first day of the REC and that they should be in silence as they go back to their housing areas. The purpose of the silence is to keep them individually focused on the example they have just been given of someone who has "been there" and "done that." Also, because we are aware that Residents, in general, tend to rebel against authority, we have imposed a rule we hope they will break when they get back to their housing areas. We hope they will get together and discuss the last speaker's story and how portions of it are like episodes in their own lives.

DESIRED RESPONSE: As each Resident leaves the conference room at the end of Day One, what we want them to be thinking about is, although I may have never thought about it, (1) "my life is off track," (2) "God can put me back on track if I am willing" and (3) "if God will take that last speaker back surely I have a chance too." In short, THERE IS HOPE FOR ME.

SUGGESTED SCRIPTURES:

Romans 5:8-9 But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, *Christ died* for us. Much more then, being now justified by his blood, we shall be saved from *wrath through him*.

Luke 18-27 And he said, The things which are impossible with men are possible with God.

Romans 8:31 What shall we then say to these things: If God be for us, who can be against us?

2 Timothy 1:7 For God hat not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love and of a sound mind.

A CHANGE OF HEART

While Christ presented Himself as a living sacrifice and did for us what we could not do for ourselves, there are a few steps we must each take to claim our victories. God accepts us "just as we are." This is our turning around, our awakened awareness, our eyes being opened to the love and companionship of God, and saying "yes" to the offer. (Length: 30 minutes)

PURPOSE OF THE TALK: to accept *the* relationship that God offers. We must take the first step by opening our hearts *to* change.

POINTS TO COVER:

1. We do not have to change before God will save us (that is, we do not have to earn our salvation.
2. It is the patterns in our lives that keep us apart from God and we must be willing to allow those patterns to be changed.
3. God will lead us, gradually, to new life patterns if we are willing.

SUGGESTED APPROACHES:

1. Use of "extreme makeover" tv shows; change can only happen from inside out
2. When we are willing to let God change us, God will open our spiritual eyes to our need of Him and the opportunities He gives us to help others

SUGGESTED W SCRIPTURES:

Matthew 7:7-8 Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you: For everyone that asketh receiveth; and he that seeketh findeth; and *to him* that knocketh it shall be opened.

Romans 12:2 And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is the good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God.

Philippians 3:13-14. Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.

SACRED SCRIPTURES

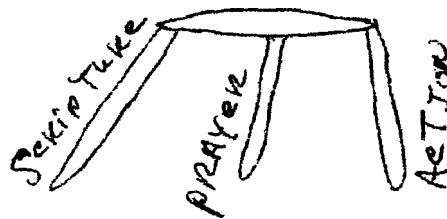
Unlike the Emmaus talk, "Growth Through Study", which focuses on effective methods of study, this talk should introduce the listener to the Holy Bible as if they were hearing of it for the first time. Ideally it should make them curious enough to want to read it for themselves. (Length 20 minutes)

PURPOSE OF THE TALK: To make the Residents hungry to know the mysteries and promises of God's Holy Word.

POINTS TO COVER:

1. The Bible is the inspired word of God
2. It is the roadmap to the Christian life
3. It is ESSENTIAL

This is the first leg of the three-legged stool: scripture, prayer and action



SUGGESTED APPROACHES

1. Explain that it is not written in chronological order and it is written by different authors and has 66 books
2. Give a "history" less of the bible
3. Present an "infomercial" and "sell" the Bible
4. Create a curiosity to learn more
5. Explain why there are several translations of the Bible; why there is not just "one" version
6. Provide a modified study guide, like a bookmark
7. Often when you are reading Scripture, all of a sudden there will be a new insight for you.

SUGGESTED SCRIPTURES:

GOD IS LOVE

Generally considered to be the second spiritual team talk, with an emphasis on John 3:16, this talk should help the listener to gain a greater understanding of what unconditional love really is and how far God will go to win us back into the Body of Christ (Length 20 minutes)

PURPOSE OF THE TALK: TO CAUSE THE Residents to understand that, regardless of their station in life, they are precious to God and that the forgiveness of their sins has already been bought with the Blood of Christ

POINTS TO COVER:

1. Introduce Jesus as *the* perfect example of God's unconditional love, the ultimate sacrifice
2. This love cannot be "earned"
3. It is already bought and paid for

SUGGESTED APPROACHES:

1. John 3:16 - have the Residents personalize this by use of their own name in the verses or that of their table name
2. Clarify it is not "falling in love" but a choice
3. There is nothing you can do to make God love you more; there is nothing you can do to make God love you less

SUGGESTED SCRIPTURES:

1. John 3:16
2. Romans 8:38
3. Romans 5:6-9
4. Romans 6:23
5. Romans 3:23-24

PRAYER

As in any other relationship it is necessary for Christians to talk to God and patiently wait for His answers. At the conclusion of this talk, the listener should take comfort in the knowledge that prayer works. The Residents will each receive a copy of the Prayer of Jabez after this talk (if the book is available). (Length 20 minutes)

PURPOSE OF THE TALK: TO CAUSE THE Residents to be at ease with the fact that, because He really does love us, God really wants us to share our inner-most burdens, hopes and gratitudes with Him, through prayer.

POINTS TO COVER:

1. Prayer is powerful
2. Prayer is essential to being a Christian (the second leg of the three-legged stool)
3. Prayer is easy.

SUGGESTED APPROACHES:

1. How does God talk back to me? As we "expect" His answer, we listen.
Scripture, inner voice, wise counsel of others, inner peace and thru circumstances
2. Use the Lord's Prayer as a model, most will know it, perhaps end the talk with having everyone say
this Prayer together.

SUGGESTED SCRIPTURES:

Matthew 7:7
James 5:16
Mark 11:24-25

CHRISTIAN LIFE

Purpose of the Talk: This presentation should help clear the minds of Residents concerning false images they may have of the "Christian life". This talk should help them understand that they must walk the walk as well as talk the talk because faith without works is dead. (Length 20 minutes)

Points to Cover:

1. Dispel false notions of what the Christian life is
2. Tell what a Christian life "really" is
3. The Christian life leads to Christian action, allow God to lead you (this is the 3rd leg of the three legged stool)

Suggested Approaches:

1. The Great Commandment go out and make disciples
2. Remind them of what Jesus said are the two greatest commandments: have no other God before God and love they neighbor as thyself
3. Living a Christian life can be described as "Jesus with skin on"
4. Be willing to step out of your comfort zone, ie many of the team this weekend have done just that
5. Explain:
"Christ has no hands, but our hands, to do His work today.
He has no feet, but our feet, to lead men in His way.
He has no tongue, but our tongue, to tell men how He died.
He has no help, but our help, to bring men to His side."
6. Jesus is calling us to get out of the boat
7. Living the Christian life is a "good" thing, not bad
8. Never quit, there is no retirement plan
9. Jesus can use any of us, the twelve disciples were ordinary people
10. God never quits calling us to live as Christians, Peter denied Him three times

Suggested Scriptures:

SINGLE LIFE TALK

Purpose of the Talk: There will be seasons in all our lives when we are single (before marriage, divorce, death, or never marry). This talk should help the Residents learn "how" to live as a single Christian during those seasons when they are single. (Length 20 minutes.)

Points to Cover:

(This talk should be varied for men and women. The points to emphasize and clarify will differ and the speaker should take this into consideration, ie many of the men have abandoned their kids; most of the women are still responsible for their children)

1. Relationships: Learn to recognize, appreciate and foster those relationships that strengthen you and help you grow (family, coworkers, neighbors, people you admire)
2. Responsibility: Learn to be responsible "For" self and "To" others (this is *different* for men and women)
3. Personal Growth: Focus on how to grow as a Christian adult. Learn to take care of the self first before entering a relationship. Love thy neighbor as thyself. You must get to a place where you are happy with your life apart from a dating relationship in order to be happy "with" one. (From: Boundaries in Dating by Cloud and Townsend)

Suggested Approaches:

1. The speaker should share "some" of their experience but this is only a small part of the talk
2. How to handle pornography for self and when it appears in the relationship (recommended reading "Everyman's Battle" by Arterburn and Stoeker)
3. Discuss the question that if you never marry can you be a "whole" person
4. What makes a man a man
5. What makes a woman a woman
6. For women, some will feel shame from past sexual experiences, clarify that God can wash them white as snow
7. Men and women really are different; explain, refer to book "Men are From Mars, Women are From Venus" or other books on this topic
8. A Christian will remain sexually abstinent until marriage

Suggested Scriptures:

MARRIAGE TALK

Purpose of the Talk: This presentation is made jointly by both husband and wife, equally sharing the content and delivery time of their talk. It should explain *how their marriage has* been used by God in their personal relationship, within the family unit, and in their Christian community. This talk should help the Residents realize that marriage will never be successful without the presence of God. (Length 20 minutes)

Points to Cover:

1. Marriage is not a "destination", but it is a *point along the way*
2. Marriage is not a 50-50 proposition but rather a 100% commitment
3. God has to have an active role in a Christian marriage (give examples from your own marriage)

Suggested Approaches:

1. Explain the triangle (as you grow closer to God, you grow closer to each other, as you grow closer to each other, you grow closer to God) A cord of three stands is not easily broken
2. Marriage is hard work
3. "Briefly" summarize your marriage
4. What happens when a couple are not equally yoked, not equal in their faith journey when one grows as a Christian and the other does not.

(Note: *Both the Marriage Talk* and the Single Life Talk which follows should focus on life as a process where God is growing you - as an individual and as a couple)

Suggested Scriptures:

Mark 10: 6-9

Matthew 19:3-6

CHRISTIAN IN THE WORLD

Purpose of the Talk: This is the last formal talk. The speaker should begin by quickly reviewing the themes of the three days: to die with Christ, to rise with Christ, to go with Christ. Most of the Residents are anxious to be active Christians, but they have some hesitation because of the obstacles they know will have to be faced. This talk should be an encouragement to them. The speaker should tell them in a practical way: "It can be done one day at a time, and I'm trying to do it. Some days are better and easier than others." Identify and offer truthful examples and methods they can become involved in such as groups and other opportunities to "get involved." Identify simple things and servant roles of service in the church.

Points to Covet

1. Every single task and behavior we perform in service and response to God is to His glory.
2. These responses allow Him to work through us as an example for others to follow
3. Thus He can use each one of us as a leader/servant/ worker in His world

Suggested Approaches:

1. It begins with small things like a smile, a kind word. It is a process which will grow into more.
2. Don't "expect" it to all happen at once
3. We are to plant the seeds
4. It is not going to always be easy
5. These will be a blessing both to you and to others you come into contact with
6. Where you are is not "who" you are
7. Bruce Carroll wrote in a song: Wounded people everywhere. And when they look at
us, do they see Jesus there? Who will be Jesus to them?
Who'll show love that restores them again?
Oh, they do not need a judge, they need a friend
Who will be Jesus to them?
8. For most people it is not what they think they are that holds them back It is what they think
they are not.
9. Satan does not care how good your intentions are, so long as they are focused
on
"tomorrow
10. Twenty years from now you will be more disappointed by the things you didn't do than by
the ones
you did. (Mark Twain)

Suggested Scriptures:

Jeremiah 31.34 I will forgive their sins and I will no longer remember their wrongs. I, the Lord have spoken.

BEYOND REC

This talk introduces the idea of the "Fourth Day" of REC. The speaker covers (in brief form, staying close to the outline) a number of things to do and not to do to help support the REC program. Notes are not taken during this talk (length: 15 minutes)

Points to Cover:

1. The "Fourth Day". We told you 3 days; there are really 4. Today is the first day of the rest of your life. The first three days were in ideal conditions. But there are obstacles to the Fourth Day: People may not understand; they may not want to hear about REC; your problems will still be there when you return to the routine of your life (don't forget to talk to God thru prayer and stay in touch with the REC community); the most meaningful thanks you can give the team is to live out your "Fourth Day" as best you can. You don't need to thank the team for anything.

2. You can help REC by: encouraging your friends to sign up for an REC; pray for the REC community and future weekends; Write letters to future REC participants; stay in touch with the jail Chaplain and volunteer to help where possible.

You can hurt REC by: talking things out of context. For example, "only" talk about the fun times and the posters. If you only stress the good time you had on the weekend, you could create a false image of REC. Don't break confidences. What was discussed at your table and what you heard in the chapel visits are to be kept in confidence. Don't tell future REC residents everything that takes place on the weekend. Don't form cliques. Remember that you share REC with others by who you are and what you do. Share with everyone the peace, love and joy which you found at REC.

3. Support is available. Give ideas of groups open to them once they leave the facility. Have handouts for groups such as: Crossroads; SOAR, local churches, local Bible studies. Don't try to make it on your own. You need the support of Christian friends. Be sure to handout or write on a chalk board the mailing address for DaySpring REC. Include the REC website address.

4. REC is an experience that is hard to describe. Show others by your example rather than trying to put REC into words. Share Christ's love and concern for others.

When others ask....rather than try to explain the parts of the weekend, tell them what you personally got out of REC and encourage them to come and see.

Welcome to the REC Family

MEANS OF GRACE – must be given by clergy

PURPOSE:

The single purpose of this talk is to prepare the residents for Dying Moments (to confess their sins to God and receive Christ).

POINTS TO COVER:

1. Holy Sacraments are outward signs of inward changes and have been a part of Christ's church from the beginning.
2. Briefly mention the lesser and more common Sacraments, dwelling only on Baptism and Marriage (because these are the most familiar).
3. An in-depth explanation of the acts and significance of Holy Communion. Of all the talks this should be the least about the speaker and the most about God's Plan of Salvation and what is required of us as Children of God.

DYING MOMENTS

Up to this point in the weekend the overall focus has been leading up to this moment. "Dying Moments" are the points in our lives when we confess and let go of those things that are separating us from God. They may include unconfessed sins, prejudices, feelings of unworthiness, resentments, or anything else that stands in the way of a close personal relationship with Christ. Once these burdens have been turned over to God they are dead to us. The point at which we let go and accept our forgiveness is a dying moment.

Ideals Critique

INSTRUCTIONS:

A spiritual team member should be in each group for their perspective. Pray for each speaker before the talk. Review the following Purpose and Points to be covered with the team. Ask for a volunteer to time the talk.

Explain that following each talk, the speaker will leave the room. The group will then list 2 or 3 strong points and, if needed, 2 or 3 suggestions that could strengthen it further. Remind the speaker these are suggestions to help the Residents get a clear understanding of the talk topic.

Remember to discuss the time and length of talk. Time is important! If too long or too short, suggest possible ideas to help the speaker.

Explain that following each talk, the speaker will leave the room. The group will then list 2 or 3 strong points and, if needed, 2 or 3 suggestions that could strengthen it further. Remind the speaker these are suggestions to help the Residents get a clear understanding of the talk topic.

Remember to discuss the time and length of talk. Time is important! If too long or too short, suggest possible ideas to help the speaker.

Speaker returns and short discussion follows. Be kind, positive and allow each speaker to be themselves.

Purpose: This presentation is made jointly by both husband and wife, equally sharing the content and delivery time of their talk. It should explain how their marriage has been used by God in their personal relationship, within the family unit, and in their Christian community. This talk should help the Residents realize that marriage will never be successful without the presence of God.

Points:

1. Marriage is not a "destination", but it is a *point along the way*
2. Marriage is not a 50-50 proposition but rather a 100% commitment
3. God has to have an active role in a Christian marriage (give examples from your own marriage)

INSTRUCTIONS:

A spiritual team member should be in each group for their perspective. Pray for each speaker before the talk. Review the following Purpose and Points to be covered with the team. Ask for a volunteer to time the talk.

Explain that following each talk, the speaker will leave the room. The group will then list 2 or 3 strong points and, if needed, 2 or 3 suggestions that could strengthen it further. Remind the speaker these are suggestions to help the Residents get a clear understanding of the talk topic.

Remember to discuss the time and length of talk. Time is important! If too long or too short, suggest possible ideas to help the speaker.

Speaker returns and short discussion follows. Be kind, positive and allow each speaker to be themselves.

Purpose: This is the last formal talk. The speaker should begin by quickly reviewing the themes of the three days: to die with Christ, to rise with Christ, to go with Christ. Most of the Residents are anxious to be active Christians, but they have some hesitation because of the obstacles they know will have to be faced. This talk should be an encouragement to them. The speaker should tell them in a practical way: "It can be done one day at a time, and I'm trying to do it. Some days are better and easier than others." Identify and offer truthful examples and methods they can become involved in such as groups and other opportunities to "get involved." Identify simple things and servant roles of service in the church.

Points:

1. Every single task and behavior we perform in service and response to God is to His glory.
2. These responses allow Him to work through us as an example for others to follow.
3. Thus He can use each one of us as a leader/servant/ worker in His world.

This information will be inserted in the personalized Team Manuals along with other files such as the Team Prayer Chart and Team Roster (Please: Do not stick any labels on the manuals). It will serve as an outline for small group discussions during the first Formation meeting when Team Manuals will be distributed.

ROLES OF ASSISTANT LAY DIRECTORS

There are two Assistants. Each has a separate and distinct role during formation meetings and during the weekend. These roles are generally not interchangeable. They are complementary and support the Lay Director.

Coordinates with the LD when adjustments are needed.</p> <p>See to it that someone is in prayer before, during and after each talk. See to it that the speaker has the Speaker’s Cross before giving his talk.</p>	Reads REC script and makes announcements to the group.

ROLE OF THE MUSIC TEAM

1. Music is a vital part of the REC program worship experience. The Formation Meetings and the REC weekend are all important events needing the music team
2. Formation meetings are an important time of bonding among team members. It is important for the Music Team to participate and become fully integrated into the team. In addition, their effort add an important dimension to the worship experiences that occur during the team formation process.

During the Formation Meeting periods they are not performing, the time should be spent discussion about their music selections, and the logistical aspects to get maximum participation during the weekend. Equipment items needed to display music for everyone, Etc., must be identified and obtained. These decisions should be planned during the formation meetings and not be left to the last moment.

3. Music during The REC Weekend is a vital tool for worship and for bringing everyone closer relationship with Jesus. It is amazing to watch residents respond to the music and to sometimes display incredible musical gifts and talents. This is all brought out and released through the power of music.

Throughout the weekend the team must be constantly aware of the mood and direction of the activities and presentations. Your awareness and timing are often critical to heightening the feelings and mood of the events and entire weekend experience. Your ability to respond on a moment's notice with appropriate music often has dramatically and far-reaching results.

Over the course of the weekend, a wide variety of musical types, flavors, styles, and moods can be effectively applied. And, an number of intimate worship experiences can be amplified. The residents always express great joy and appreciation.

ROLE OF THE SPIRITUAL TEAM

1. The Spiritual Team is an integral part of the Formation team. At these meetings, the Team provides spiritual leadership and direction. They encourage an attitude of reverence and spiritual development of the team. They provide prayer and offer communion.

A member of spiritual team is required to preview each talk presented during the weekend. The Spiritual Team conducts the team's Dying Moments Service. The Spiritual Team conducts the teams' anointing service, and Dying Moments for the Team on Friday.

2. During the Weekend they perform special tasks and are available to the residents for counseling and prayer. Since the REC is considered a "Lay Ministry" the weekend is primarily devoted to planting seeds and expressing the Love of Christ Jesus through personal testimonies and various forms of Agape. An "Alter Call" should only be conducted with full permission of the Lay Director and should be associated with the most intense spiritual moments of the weekend such as Dying Moments and/or after Candlelight Service.
- The following are unique responsibilities expected of the Spiritual Director who is approved by the REC Board:
 - a. Has final word on interpretation of Scripture during the weekend;
 - b. Gives morning meditations on both Saturday and Sunday;
 - c. Remains at the facility during the Candlelight service and performs Dying Moments;
 - d. Conducts Communion Service on Sunday afternoon;
 - e. Facilitates Baptisms (if requested by Residents) at a date following the REC.
 - The Means of Grace talk is to be given by a member of the Spiritual Team. If available, members of the Spiritual Team may also give the God is Calling and God is Love talks. A spiritual team member prays with speakers before and after their talks.
 - At Candlelight Community Service, a member of the Spiritual Team co-leads the service together with the ALD. Spiritual Team provides prayer, gives the meditation, and conducts Communion for the Community.
- Please Note:** The Spiritual Team may be comprised of clergy and this is encouraged, but is not a requirement. The Spiritual Team should be approved by the Board.

ROLE OF TABLE LEADERS

1. During Formation meetings, critique talks and individually prepare at least one question for each talk you hear. The question should be one you would ask the residents at your table to stimulate discussion and address the purpose of the talk. Be prepared to be called upon to express your question.
2. REC Weekend:
 - Keep on the subject AND FOCUSED – be kind, but firm, in directing.
 - Help table participants “jell” as a group
 - a. Develop friendships
 - b. Develop trust level
 - c. Be aware of special needs – Those who can’t read, etc.
 - Get the ball moving
 - a. What struck the group as meaningful or raised questions?
 - b. Throw out a thought from talk to get going if group is slow. Encourage reactions.
 - BE A FACILITATOR - Encourage participation without forcing anyone.
 - a. Try to be sensitive whenever you feel a more quiet member has something to contribute.
 - b. Help open the door for her contribution, but don’t force.
 - c. May need to police the overly talkative.
 - d. May alternate between spontaneous or around-the-table sharing opportunities.
 - Summarize and tie together periodically.
 - Try to move ahead whenever it seems discussion on a particular point has been Sufficiently exhausted.
 - The table leader leads the group in prayer during chapel visits on Saturday. The assistant table leader closes the chapel visit.
 - Participate in Cross Ceremony by giving crosses to residents. Gives Agape Bags to residents at closing.
3. Report the status and progress of your table when the team de-briefs after returning to the lodging site each night.
4. Performs other tasks as requested by the Lay Director.

ROLE OF ASSISTANT TABLE LEADERS

1. Prior to Formation meetings, prepare talks using the outline and support information provided by the Lay Director. At the assigned formation meeting, present the talk to the team. Prayerfully consider and implement critique comments.

3. REC Weekend:
 - Support the Table leaders before and after talk is given.
 - Help table participants “jell” as a group
 - a. Develop friendships
 - b. Develop trust level
 - c. Be aware of special needs – Those who can’t read, etc.
 - Get the ball moving
 - a. What struck the group as meaningful or raised questions?
 - c. Throw out a thought from talk to get going if group is slow. Encourage reactions.
 - BE A FACILITATOR - Encourage participation without forcing anyone.
 - a. Try to be sensitive whenever you feel a more quiet member has something to contribute.
 - b. Help open the door for her contribution, but don’t force.
 - c. May need to police the overly talkative.
 - d. May alternate between spontaneous or around-the-table sharing opportunities.
 - Try to move ahead whenever it seems discussion on a particular point has been sufficiently exhausted.
 - The assistant table leader leads the group in prayer at the end of chapel visits on Saturday.
 - Participate in Cross Ceremony by reading names of table residents and handing out Certificates. Gives Agape Bags to residents at closing.

4. Report the status and progress of the table when the team de-briefs after returning to the lodging site each night.

ROLE OF THE AGAPE TEAM

1. This is a very important part of the REC team. It is like being a stage hand; always prepared for the next segment of the program. You really are as an enabler, enabling the REC weekend to run smoothly.
2. Only the Agape Team Leader is authorized to handle the Agape Team finances. He will make provide funds and keep receipts. His record of expenditures will be furnished to the Assistant Lay Director for finance for reimbursement that is due by the REC.
3. Below are some of the responsibilities of the Agape Team at Formation meetings: Prepare the supplies, help set up and cleanup for the formation meetings.
4. Below are some of the roles of the Agape Team at the lodging site:
 - Receive and prepare the Agape that comes in.
 - Prepare the supplies and setup at the lodging facility.
 - Set up snacks and meals + help cleanup when finished.
 - See that the name tags, crosses and agape bags are prepared and properly stored for Cross Ceremony.
5. You must familiarize yourself with the locations and activities that are to occur during the weekend. Assist one another and the Agape Team Leader in meeting the needs and special requests of the residents and the team while at the facility.
 - Set up the space and prepare tables at the facility for the weekend.
 - Deliver and pick-up the photos (5 X 7 with no border).
 - See that speaker's Handouts are given to residents at the proper time.
 - Prepare and serve coffee and refreshments.
 - Collect the posters and display after the poster showings.
 - Hang the banners for each day.
 - Set up for all communion services and the Candlelight.
 - Prepare and stuff agape bags and insure they are available for the residents after the Closing Ceremony.
6. Perform other tasks as requested by the Lay Director.

You will have the opportunity to go, as a table, off in another area and pray, or talk to God. If you want to express your feelings, your love for Christ, out loud, please feel free to do so.

This concludes the formal presentations of your REC weekend. We sincerely hope and pray this experience has brought you closer to God, and to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. But before we start to close our weekend, we want to present you with a personal Bible [**Branchville: cross**] to commemorate your decisions here this weekend, and a personal certificate confirming your completion of the REC Program. These items will be kept with your personal effects for you if you are unable to retain them here.

[Note: Next 2 paragraphs apply to Branchville RECs]

You will notice your cross is like the ones worn by the team members. They identify your REC weekend as being part of the national Emmaus Community. It is our prayer that after being released, you will continue to grow in your walk with Jesus by participating in other Emmaus Community programs and activities. Perhaps you will complete a Walk to Emmaus weekend. That's how the team received our crosses. This cross does not set you apart from other Christians. You have not joined a special club or society, but simply accepted your responsibility in the ministry of love in the name of Jesus Christ.

The cross that you will receive is a very special cross. It, has been prayed over by your sponsor and other Christian friends. They have prayed for you when they held that cross in their hands. There is nothing magic about this cross, but is your special cross and your connection to God through this very-special ministry.

To receive your Bible [**Branchville: cross**] and certificates, we will proceed one table at time. The Table Leader and Assistant Table Leader will come up front.. The ATL will read your name and present your certificate.

You will then go over the Table Leader who is holding your Bible [Branchville: cross]. When you arrive in front of him, we want you to softly say these words: **“I am counting on Christ.”**

Your Table Leader will respond with the words: **“Christ is counting on you.”** At that time he will hand you your Bible [Branchville: place the cross around your neck].

After you have received your Bible [Branchville: cross], we ask you to quietly return to your seat. We ask you to remain silent until everyone has received their cross.

I would now like to ask leaders of (name of table) to come forward and make their presentations.

This ALMOST concludes the Cross Ceremony, but we seem to have one additional cross remaining to give out...

(ALD INVITES LD TO PODIUM)

Throughout the weekend the team has shared this cross and a second one just like it. Each speaker was prayed over in the adjacent room just before they came forward to speak. When they came forward, each one carried one of these crosses throughout the entire talk. The whole time they were talking, a person remained in the adjacent room praying for them and holding the second cross. These actions acknowledge it is Jesus who gave the speakers the words and the strength to say them. It is the power of prayer that gave the speakers confidence and focus.

This cross is presented to the Lay Director from the REC community as a small way of saying “thanks” for your willingness to lead. It’s also a token of the love and respect the team has for your direction, guidance, patience, and awareness that God was always in control. He was a rock of strength throughout the weekend and during the months of planning as we prepared for this REC weekend. Thanks Brother on behalf of the REC Board, and your REC Team.

When you come up, we ask that you begin by saying your name and your table. Then answer the questions. To help you remember the questions, they are taped up here on the podium.

We ask that you limit your comments to answering these two questions. We also ask that you keep your answers brief, so all who wish may have a chance to speak.

TEAM FACILITY FOLLOW-UP VISITS

The REC does not end as the Team exits the facility. Many Residents have just started their Walk with Christ. They require support. They need to know the REC community is prepared to continue what it helped to start.

Part of your commitment to the REC as Lay Director is to insure a monthly presence of the REC is exhibited. Soon after the Weekend is complete, the LD should contact the facility Chaplain or official point of contact. Purpose of this contact is to coordinate arrangements for monthly return visits. Discuss a date, time, and location for follow-up meetings. And determine what items can be brought in such as soft drinks, snacks, etc.

These follow-on meetings are an opportunity to show continued support through a brief program:

Informal Fellowship
Prayer
Music (optional)
Devotional
Communion
Informal Fellowship
Closing Prayer

The devotion can take the form of a short sermon or testimonial or book report or just about any presentation that centers of Jesus as our Savior.

As many members of the Team as can be available are invited. If the LD cannot attend, any member of the team can take his place, develop a program, and lead the evening.

This service is open to all members of the facility, not just those who went on the Weekend. It may serve to encourage others outside the Community.

Your REC Team is committed to continue monthly follow-on visits to the facility until the first of these two arrives:

- a. **A minimum of 6-months after the REC Weekend.**
- b. **Until the next REC at that facility.**

Some of these guys have been told all of their lives that they are worthless and that nobody could ever love them and they believe this. God has used this team to help them to realize that God loves them no matter what and Dying Moments really opened up the floodgates. The residents finally let go of the baggage of the past as God says for us to do and it was like seeing a concrete building lifted off of them. They cried and we hugged and by the time that Dying Moments was over they were all walking a lot taller.

But God is not done with these residents or with all of us. They have no idea how powerful candlelight will be. Imagine no one ever visiting you while you were in prison and then all of a sudden there are a hundred total strangers all singing and praying and lifting you up on a Saturday night. They know that none of their friends would give up a Saturday night to come and see them. On top of that the candles make it look like a glimpse of Heaven.

Thank you for being here and stay in prayer for these men for our time with them is short and they have some important decisions they need to make.
